y now, you've probably heard that the **Spreading Our Wings Capital Campaign** began last fall. Since that time, we've raised \$986,000 of the \$1.3 million we need to meet our goal.

Molina Healthcare - A New Partner

Managed Care Organizations providing Medicaid coverage here in New Mexico, is partnering with Kitchen Angels to provide home-delivered meals to their members who have been discharged from the hospital and need time at home to recover.

This is a brand new initiative for both Molina and the state's Medicaid Program. "We're thrilled to be partnering with Molina and commend them for their vision in addressing the nutrition needs of their enrollees," Tony McCarty, Executive Director, said of the partnership. "We've known for many years the importance of keeping homebound and chronically ill folks fed and, as more people gain access to healthcare under

the expansion of Medicaid, we expect client enrollment to continue to grow."

Feeding people and allowing them to remain in their own homes also makes good economic sense. Nearly 13 percent of all nursing home residents are in care only because their food needs can't be met at home. And primary care physicians are finding that hunger is directly linked to worsening health for all Americans. Social needs are as important to address as medical needs.

That point was underscored in a national survey of primary care physicians conducted several years ago by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. They found that physicians believe unmet social needs such as hunger and food insecurity are leading to worsening health for Americans. "Healthcare itself plays a surprisingly small role in life expectancy. Social circumstances, environmental exposure and behavior are estimated to account for 60 percent of the risk of premature death," the report stated.

The new Molina partnership is being carried out elsewhere in the state by other meal delivery programs. "We hope to be able to gather enough New Mexico-based data on the positive impact home-delivered meals has on the health of our clients that the other Medicaid MCOs will want to join in," Tony commented.

Sujata delivered meals to the same 5 clients every week for seven months, but her last delivery to Ann always took a little longer than the rest. What started as a series of simple friendly exchanges, soon developed into a sincere friendship. We eventually got a call from Sujata telling us that she needed to quit Kitchen Angels so she

could dedicate more time to her favorite client, Ann. The connection between these two was strong and mutually beneficial. Although we were sad to lose a great volunteer, we couldn't be happier that these two kindred spirits found each other.

Staying Fit - It's Never Too Late to Start

As we get older, staying active becomes more important than ever. Regular exercise can help boost energy, maintain independence, and help keep symptoms of illness or pain under control. Exercise can even reverse some of the symptoms of aging. And not only is exercise good for the body, it's also good for the mind, mood, and memory. Whether you are generally healthy or are managing an illness, there are plenty of ways to get more active, improve confidence, and boost your fitness. Here are a few of the "myths" many older folks believe about physical fitness:

Myth I: There's no point to exercising. I'm going to get old anyway. | Fact: Exercise and strength training help us look and feel younger and stay active longer. Regular physical activity lowers our risk for a variety of conditions, including Alzheimer's and dementia, heart disease, diabetes, certain cancers, high blood pressure, and obesity. Not only can exercise help stem the decline in strength and vitality that comes with age, it can even improve it. And the mood benefits of exercise can be just as great at 70 or 80 as they were at 20 or 30.

Myth 2: Older people shouldn't exercise. They should save their strength and rest. |Fact: Research shows that a sedentary lifestyle is unhealthy for adults over 50. Inactivity often causes older adults to lose the ability to do things on their own and can lead to more hospitalizations, doctor visits, and use of medicines for illnesses.

Myth 3: Exercise puts me at risk of falling down. | Fact: By building strength and stamina, regular exercise prevents loss of bone mass and improves balance, actually reducing our risk of falling.

Myth 4: It's too late. I'm already too old to start exercising. | Fact: One is never too old to start exercising! In fact, adults who take up exercise later in life often show greater physical and mental improvements than their younger counterparts. If you've never exercised before, or it's been a while, you won't be encumbered by the same sports injuries that many regular exercisers experience in later life. In other words, there aren't as many miles on your clock so you'll quickly start reaping the rewards. Just begin with gentle activities and build up from there.

They saw the need homebound chronically ill people under age 60 were facing in Santa Fe back in 1992 and had the courage to get Kitchen Angels off the ground. We also need to thank the Frost Foundation whose start up grant funded the operation during those early days and who helped fund the Coll-Green Angel Depot and who are still supporting us through their generous donation to our Spreading Our Wings Capital Campaign.

The very name of our building brings two other fine visionary supporters to mind as well: the late **Representative Max Coll**, who made our current building possible through the brilliance of his legislative acumen; and **Gregory Green**, a friend and former

Board President, who helped coordinate the pieces to secure the land we sit on and fund construction of the building. And of course, the **Community Farm**, who has been sharing its abundant produce with



Kitchen Angels over the years and who has helped feed countless homebound Santa Feans.

Really, there are far too many people to thank – restaurant owners who participate each year in Angels Night Out; artists who contribute to the Collectible Box Auction; donors, foundations, organizations and individuals who regularly open their hearts and wallets to help pay for our services; and state legislators, county commissioners, and city counselors, all of whom have recognized our work over the years and have honored us in so many ways.

Thank you to all for making our one million meals possible.
