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### Changes on the Horizon

New Mexico ranks as one of the most food-insecure states in the country. With nearly one in five people living in poverty, these individuals frequently have to choose between buying food and paying for needed healthcare. The problem is even more severe for people with chronic illness. According to the American Journal of Medicine, nearly one in three adults with a chronic disease has problems paying for food, medicine, or both.

A national survey of primary care physicians found that physicians believe unmet social needs (such as food insecurity) are directly leading to worsening health for Americans and that patients' social needs are as important to address as their medical conditions.

The report summarized "Health care itself plays a surprisingly small role in life expectancy. Social circumstances, environmental exposure and behavior are estimated to account for 60 percent of the risk of premature death."

Physicians feel so strongly about the connection between social needs and good health that 3 in 4 wish the health care system would pay

for costs associated with connecting patients to services that address their social needs. Access to nutrition and food represented 64 percent of the social service prescriptions physicians wish they could write.

Expansion of Medicaid coverage and the Affordable Care Act will address some of the issues related to accessing healthcare, but it will take more than just health insurance to meet people's need for good food. Kitchen Angels, along with several other local non-profit agencies, is talking to both the state's Medicaid program and the Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) with which Medicaid contracts to include coverage of, and payment for, food and nutrition services to address some of these social concerns.

The \$1,700 it costs each year to feed a Kitchen Angels client is a lot less than the annual cost for a nursing home. It's also cheaper than frequent visits to the emergency room or a single overnight hospital stay. And with a majority of our clients reporting that our meal delivery service helps them afford to see their doctors and purchase their medications, we know our program is having an impact, not just on clients' lives, but on the entire healthcare system . . . at least here in Santa Fe!

Kitchen Angels Express is the official newsletter of Kitchen Angels, a not-for-profit organization providing free hot meals to eligible homebound persons in Santa Fe. All of our clients face life-challenging situations and are ineligible for other area food programs. Our clients are selected without regard for race, color, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, or religious affiliation. Most are under 60 years of age and live at or below the poverty level. Kitchen Angels Express is published for the friends and clients of Kitchen Angels. The name "Kitchen Angels" and the angel logo are registered trademarks.

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Kitchen Angels was founded in 1992 by Tony D'Agostino, Anna Huserik, Leise Sargent, and the very first group of volunteer Angels.

#### In Memoriam

Most of you know that the building housing Kitchen Angels is the Coll-Green Angel Depot. Max Coll, who is included in our building's name and who was a major force in our acquiring the building, died this past March.

Kitchen Angels operated out of the kitchen in the Westminster Presbyterian Church until January 1996. When it became apparent that a larger space was needed, board member Gregory Green enlisted the considerable talents of then-Representative Coll, and the two were soon joined by Colonel Joe Black from the National Guard. After finding a suitable location for the expanded facility in the old New Mexico National Guard Armory on Cerrillos Road, we negotiated a 15-year lease with the Guard and the State of New Mexico.

In 1998, the National Guard transferred ownership of the Cerrillos Road building to the state. Realizing that Kitchen Angels and The Food Depot would need other quarters, Representative Coll helped develop a strategy for a new 14,000 square-foot facility that would house not only Kitchen Angels and The Food Depot, but also the weekly pantry program, Food For Santa Fe.

After a year of negotiations, a site was found on Siler Road. In 2000, the City Council approved an agreement and land lease, making the three-agency complex possible. We moved in on February 15, 2001.

Thank you Max, for making a lasting impact through your public service. Our sincere condolences to your family and friends who mourn your passing.

### A Measurable Impact on People's Lives

Scattered throughout this newsletter, you'll see some client survey statistics. That's because we recently completed our 2014 client survey and, with a 72% response rate, we learned a lot about how our services impact clients' lives.

Here are a few more interesting statistics:

- 98% of clients reported an improved diet because of our meals;
- 77% can afford to see their doctor because we help them meet their need for food;
- 72% don't know where they'd live if they couldn't stay in their home; and
- 99% are satisfied and grateful for our service.

As a program serving a chronically or terminally ill population, however, not all clients will report improvements in their condition. As we know, some clients are receiving end-of-life care while others are experiencing the effects of an increasingly debilitating illness. Changes in diet brought about by changes in medical condition don't always coincide with clients perceiving an improvement in their diet or overall quality of life. That's why client measures that look at stabilized or improved weight, improved diet, and increased ability to live independently tend also to reflect the deteriorating condition of these individuals. Nevertheless, most clients report that Kitchen Angels has had a positive impact on their lives.

These amazing results are all because our donors support our program and our volunteers take the time and energy to prepare and deliver nourishing meals to people who might otherwise have nothing to eat. You should feel proud of what your efforts have accomplished!

### Spotlight on Dottie Hill

Born and raised in Norton, Virginia, Dottie Hill has lived a full and meaningful life. She started volunteering when her children were teenagers, and hasn't stopped yet. Dottie has worked as a volunteer for many organizations, including Hospice for 20 years. When Dottie arrived in Santa Fe back in 1981, she says that she finally found her home. She's been volunteering as a delivery driver with Kitchen Angels for the past 16 years and is a shining example of a caring and responsible individual.

Every time one of Dottie's clients isn't home, she calls Kitchen Angels and lets us know. You may think this is an unimportant detail, but it helps us keep in touch with our clients to ensure they are alright and home when they say they will be.



Recently, Dottie was making a delivery soon after a client had taken a fall. He had made it into the bathtub, but couldn't get out. She helped him get upright and then called 911. Dottie stayed until the emergency response team showed up and brought our client to the hospital. If it weren't for Dottie following these procedures, our dear client might have suffered for days, without anyone knowing he was hurt. It's a good reminder that we don't JUST deliver meals. We quite often are a lifeline for our isolated clients. Thanks, Dottie, for making an effort to connect with the clients every time you delivery- it makes a world of difference. Here's to many more fruitful years of serving your community.
