Live Longer by Volunteering

t may not convey true immortality, but studies continue to point out the positive health benefits of volunteering, one of which appears to be longer life. According to a publication from Americorps, people who volunteer have lower mortality rates, greater functional ability, and lower rates of depression later in life than those who do not volunteer. And research has found that volunteering provides adults age 60 or older with greater

benefits than younger volunteers. These benefits include improved physical and mental health and greater life satisfaction. In addition, while depression may serve as a barrier to volunteer participation in mid-life adults, it is a catalyst for volunteering among older adults, who may seek to compensate for role changes and reduced social relations that occur with aging.

In 2022, Kitchen Angels was supported by 570 volunteers who gave a combined 33,909 hours (or the equivalent of just over 16 full time employees). Forty percent of our volunteers have been with us for six years or more and a few have been with us since we opened our doors in 1992.

Volunteering helps counteract the effects of stress, anger, and anxiety. The social contact that comes from helping and working with others can have a profound effect on our overall psychological well-being. Nothing relieves stress better than a meaningful connection to another person. Kitchen Angels volunteers know the extraordinary impact their gifts of time and energy have on our clients and the community. And like a mirror, those gifts are reflected back on our volunteers. Anybody There?

he Caring Callers program brings together some amazing Kitchen Angels volunteers with clients who are living alone and experiencing loneliness. The program,

which began during the pandemic, continues to bring the gift of caring conversation to nearly 20 clients each week. The callers and clients don't meet in person and what starts out as casual conversation very often develops into an over-the-phone friendship. Small talk about the weather and local events quickly becomes a deeper conversation, growing into a discussion about family, childhood memories, travels and adventures, as well as an offering of support and resources.

Conversations with our clients and volunteers consistently reveal that common ground is easily established when one genuinely open heart responds to another. What begins as a weekly volunteer assignment is soon transformed into meaningful exchanges between two people who really care about each other.

Most phone calls are light conversations, although at times some rather serious issues arise. Caring Caller volunteers are given articles on topics that our clients face including depression and anxiety, elder self-abuse, and how to deal with feelings of being overwhelmed and procrastination.

More than 90% of our clients live at or below the poverty level and must deal with chronic or terminal physical health issues as well as behavioral health issues on a daily basis. Being homebound, many become "invisible." That's why it's important to remember that these folks once contributed to the work force, raised children and led active healthy lives. They contributed to their community. The simple act of a regular phone check-in is one way to remind them that we care about them ... hence the program's name Caring Callers.

The Importance of Pet Angels

ompanion animals are especially important to our homebound clients. Although research on human-animal interactions is still relatively new, many studies have shown positive health effects, according to a report published by the National Institutes of Health. Among the effects noted, interacting with animals has been shown to decrease levels of cortisol (a stress-related hormone) and lower blood pressure. Other studies have found that animals can reduce loneliness, increase feelings of social support, and boost people's mood.

Keeping our clients' pets fed is just as important as keeping our clients fed. Kitchen Angels now provides kibble to 25 dogs and 34 cats. It's a much bigger (not to mention heavier) undertaking than most folks might imagine. A typical delivery of bags of kibble to our facility weighs 350 pounds, so processing can be quite a workout. Our intrepid volunteers Michaelene Kyrala and Judith Erger keep the program running smoothly, dividing the big sacks of pet food into smaller bags our drivers deliver to clients once each week. We're also extremely grateful to our local business partner Jose Laranga at The Feed Bin, who's been

supplying a consistently high-quality product for a number of years. But it costs money to keep Pet Angels going. That's why your gifts to support this program are important. You may designate a donation to Pet Angels from the drop-down menu on the donation payment page on our website.

From the Director

itchen Angels celebrated its 30-year anniversary in 2022, having delivered a total of 1,899,440 meals to 8,211 clients since opening our doors in 1992. For three decades, our program has been a critical element in addressing the nutrition needs for some of the most vulnerable residents of our community. Our meal delivery services mitigate the impact of poverty on the long-term health and quality of life for chronically ill and homebound individuals who might not otherwise have consistent access to healthy and nutritious food. Access to healthy food is one of the most important social determinants of health.

Thanks to the foresight and diligence of some extraordinary visionaries who responded to the need for home-delivered meals thirty years ago, Kitchen Angels has been there to bolster the safety net and ensure folks in our community have access to enough food to stay healthy.

While the pandemic played havoc with many organizations and their ability to function, our staff, volunteers, donors and Board kept Kitchen Angels true to our mission. Our volunteers are some of the most intrepid and community-minded people I've ever encountered. Every day, a cadre of kitchen, meal prep and delivery volunteers show up like clockwork to cook, package, and drive meals to clients' homes. We still see the ebb and flow of COVID infections affecting the availability of volunteers, but the degree has lessened. The lessons from the pandemic have helped us to refine our overall infectious disease management protocols (for example, during the flu season), keeping us as safe and as healthy as possible. And many of the operational changes we made in response to the pandemic have become part of our standard operating procedures. The pandemic taught us to take nothing for granted.

Client enrollment began to edge back up in 2022, to 518 from 501 in 2021, and the number of meals delivered also climbed, to 144,028. The financial support we received from our community of donors and funders remained strong and our resale store, KITCHENALITY, brought in a record amount of revenue, all of which is used to subsidize our meal delivery services. In fact, the success of our fund-raising efforts coupled with consistent store sales made it possible to grow our endowment to \$1.5 million – the realization of a long-term goal.

The pandemic that spurred the creation of Kitchen Angels may have faded just as the COVID-19 pandemic is fading. But one thing that will never fade is the strength, resilience, and tenacity of the Kitchen Angels community. As I've said many times, we were born out of challenging times and rising to a challenge is part of our DNA. Our volunteers know this, our staff knows this, our donors know this, and our clients count on this.



Sustaining Meals

he Bread & Butter Club is our monthly recurring donation program. It's an easy way to give every month and provide nutritious meals to our clients year-round. We hosted our first Bread & Butter Club brunch at Kitchen Angels in February and gave tours of our facility and coupons to shop at Kitchenality. It was also an opportunity for the 42 Bread & Butter Club members to meet and get acquainted with each other. 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Unexpected Outcome

ur resale store, KITCHENALITY, is a remarkable source of income for our program. But there is an additional benefit to the community that many don't realize. Items that don't make it into the store are used to help set up kitchens for re-housed domestic abuse survivors, formerly homeless individuals, refugees, and folks re-establishing a home after a disastrous event. Our referrals come through Santa Fe Connect, a network of clinics, community organizations, and city and county programs that link people to services and resources in our community. Last year, we assisted 66 individuals from 15 agencies around Santa Fe. This is a terrific and unexpected outcome that we are pleased to offer our community. \P
